


"THE PRESIDENT'S CORNER"




"ATLANTA, GA. - 1986"







Dear Harley:

It is a privilege to write to you on the occasion of the 1985 reunion of the 82nd Fighter Group Association. I am gratified that your members still share strong memories of Lockheed's P-38 Lightning. It is a testament to both the proficiency of the squadrons that flew it and the young company that produced it.

Few of us can even think of the war without envisioning the distinctive twintailed shape of the P-38 locked in combat with German Messerschmitts and Focke Wulfs. It is an image etched in the mind of even those who did not live it. Just the mention of the P-38 carries with it a sense of the dedication, risk-taking, and courage of those perilous yet exciting days.

While Lockheed was pushing P-38 production to as many as five per day, reports of the successes of your fighter group and others provided the best incentive possible for the round-the-clock assembly crews in Burbank to keep up their frantic pace. They heard of your exploits from newsreels and newspapers, and saw the colorful names and adornments you gave your new birds. Some of the 82nd's more famous missions, such as the bombing raid on Ploesti and Italian strafing attacks, helped change the course of the war.

Other exploits of the 82nd still echo through the corridors of time. We can remember how you downed two Junker 88s over the Bay of Biscay even before you reached your base of operations in the Mediterranean. We recall how you felled 17 Luftwaffe aircraft on April 5, 1943, in a massive battle during which only four P-38s were lost. And we remember the escort mission to Cancello, Italy during which 24 German aircraft were downed and the 82nd won its second Distinguished Unit Citation.

I salute you, therefore, not only for your past glories, but also for your efforts in keeping the legend of the P-38 Lightning alive and shining these many years. It is an accomplishment that we at Lockheed sincerely applaud.





From Robert Schultz, 4241 Rolling Oaks Drive, Winter Haven, FL. 33880.

Guess what - I'm the pilot of the P-38 that crash landed in the olive grove at Lecce and survived because of Sgt Walter Carlson's prompt and heroic action. Let me help bring it back to light as Stan Kupcinskas has suggested.

On that fateful day, as a new replacement pilot with the grand total of 15 or 20 hours of twin engine time and anxious to get some additional P-38 time, I took the job of putting some "slow time" on the engines of the plane. As I recall I lost power in both engines as I was taking off and as result crash landed in the olive grove. The next thing I recall was sitting under a tree and seeing the plane burning. I do not remember getting out at all so I'm sure everyone will realize how much Sgt. Carlson's heroic action meant to me.

Spent a few days at a hospital and returned to the squadron. There was an investigation of some sort as I was called in for a full report of what happened and given a "after crash" piggy-back flight by the C.O. Did not hear anymore about it.

Walter and I have kept in touch over the years and enjoyed talking to him on the telephone a few months ago. To all that knew of Walter's prompt action in saving my life and for those that don't, let me say: "Walter, thank you again and I'm mighty glad you were there".

From Joseph Shannon, 4316 Linwood Dr., Birmingham, AL. 35222:

This was a well kept secret. Wallace Reyerson was Intelligence Officer of the 97th. So far as I know, none of the pilots of the 97th knew that "Uncle Wally" was a WW I aviator!



Reyerson, Wallace Eugene, 2nd Lt. U.S. Air Service. Born on 1 August 1897 in Dawson, Minnesota. He enlisted November 1917 at Chicago and graduated from University of Illinois School of Military Aeronautics on 27 April 1918. Cadet Reyerson received preliminary flying training in the JN-4 airplane at Chanute Field, Rantoul, Illinois, May - 15 July 1918 when he was ordered to Camp Dick, Texas to await assignment. He received his Reserve Military Aviator rating and was commissioned a 2nd Lt. on 5 July 1918. Lt. Reyerson received advanced combat flying training in the JN-4D airplane at Payne Field, West Point, Mississippi on 8 August 1918 and classified as a pursuit pilot on 3 October 1918. He received orders on 1 October 1918 to Garden City, L.I., N.Y. for overseas shipment but was delayed when the war ended. Lt. Reyerson was discharged there on 8 December 1918. He served in WW II as a Fifteenth Air Force staff air intelligence officer in the grade of Major.






Ted Latta and the Droopsnoot P-38

Brig. Gen. Clarence T. "Curley" Edwinson, USAF (Ret), who commanded the 82nd Fighter Group from August 28 to November 22, 1944 passed away on June 10, 1985 in Austin, TX., and was interned in the Ft. Sam Houston National Cemetery.
