VIRGINIA BROOKS

However, the next morning a bunch of us from the Radio Shack inspected it but soon went back to the Radio Shack. Max Pelletier, a sergeant in the Radio Section, listened to us talking about it and went to look it over for himself.

While Max was still looking over the B-24, a P-38 lost power when its engines cut out and crashed into an Italian Macchi and started to burn.

Included in the last newsletter was a list of names of those intending to attend the upcoming reunion in Denver. The next to the last name should be Louis (and not Lois) Zucal. Louis was the Clerk of the 97th Squadron's Radio Section (of which I was a member) and I

Max (being close by) ran up the wing of the burning 38, popped the canopy and dragged the pilot to safety.

When Max got back to the Radio Shack, nothing was said about the deed. Soon, though, the 97th Communications Officer, Lt. Lehe, came in the Shack and asked Max if he was the one who pulled the pilot to safety and Max admitted he was the one.

Nothing more was said then but a few days later, Max received the Soldier's Medal before a full-dress formation. Soon after this event, and after the Group moved to Foggia, Rotation to the States was started up for the enlisted men and - because of his bravery - Max was the first GI from the 97th to get to go home.

I am also enclosing two snapshots. One of Max Pelletier in a P-38 cockpit and the other of some 97th radiomen including McSpadden and Pelletier.

(Ed's note: Charlie was responding to our request for info regarding the 97's rep in the Link Trainer Section. We knew him only as "Mac" and his last name sort of sounded like McSpadden [or MacDonald or MacIntosh]. We didn't know the guy too well because he wasn't around too much. We talked to Louis Zucal and he couldn't recall the man.

Hope you and Pat are happy despite any physical ailments we all must face these days.





From all of the pre-reunion "hype" emanating from the Denver area it appears that Ralph is going to score a new record high for attendance at an 82nd Group Reunion.



What a great day! Thanks, 82nd FTW personnel.


Now for the bad news. "Willy" is on the Feds' hit list of Air Force facilities to be closed. We'll keep our fingers crossed.
