
















Out Of The P.O. Box


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FROM LAURIE LAWRENCE (By Phone)

(Ed's note: Jack calls himself "A former 97th welder - everything from stoves out of 50 gal drums to parts for P-38s.")


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FROM ED & PHYL SCOTT (to Roy N.)

When we were at Souk-el-Arba, it was so hot I got blisters on my arm when I rested it on the window rail. And D U S T -- a pilot almost had to taxi out to the runway on instruments. We could have used the "Blue & Yellow" jobbie, not having had any Link time in nearly a year. Back at Berteaux near Constantine in Algeria, we had cold and damp weather. We burned 100 octane gas in home-made stoves (which blew up occasionally). I remember the guys in one tent

throwing things out that were on fire. I also remember three veteran pilots throwing the fourth cot out of their tent after having three tent mates in three weeks shot down. They figured that corner of the tent was jinxed plus they were tired of packing up the belongings for shipment to parents.

I called Days Inn in St. Louis & got a confirmation number for a room. After a couple of weeks I called back and asked if I wasn't supposed to pay in advance and they said, "Yes, \$62." Reunion hotels in other cities have sent brochures about all the perks they had - but I've received nothing from St. Louis' Days Inn.
