

PRESIDENTS YEAR END SUMMARY

Since the great wind blew us out of Florida and me into the presidency we have been making a few changes. Sorry I haven't answered all the letters but we have been working on most of the ideas submitted. I would like to thank every one for the excellent suggestions, both, what should be done and how to accomplish it.

We have put about 120 members on the inactive roster since they had paid no dues in over 5 years and answered "no" or did not reply to the question "Do you want to continue receiving the newsletter". This will reduce our newsletter cost considerably.

Since Dick decided it was time for him to catch up on some of his long delayed projects, Roy Norris put out the March issue and starting with this issue Hank Phillips becomes our new editor. Thanks again Dick. We certainly appreciate your MANY, MANY hours of dedicated work for the 82nd.

Del and Mary Ryland are working on the 1997 reunion, to be held at the Safari in Scottsdale, Arizona in mid Oct. It looks very good and they will have full details at the Boston Reunion.

Buddy Strozier's info on the Russian Medal will give several pilots and ground crew members (both enlisted and commissioned) much deserved recognition.

With help from several members I was able to contact John Kingsley (former President of the S/Sgt Pilots Assn.) who had put together a memorabilia packet which he asked me to deliver to the March Field Museum. Even though John was near death at the time he was working to arrange for more memorabilia to be transferred from the Fighter Aces museum in Mesa, Arizona to the March Field Museum also. I delivered the bronze plaques (mounted on a 5ft high, marbleized base) along with (8) framed photos to March so they could be displayed for the P38 National Assn. Reunion which was held in May. When I arrived, sculptor Henderson, a crane operator, and a man from the museum were unloading the 1/4 scale model, bronze P38 to mount at it's resting site. They asked for some assistance so I had the pleasure helping to handle that beautiful piece of artwork for the next hour or so.

The P38 National Assn. (of which many 82nd members also belong) has raised over \$60,000 through private contributions to pay for the 13ft bronze P38 and it's marble base. It's a beautiful sight to observe. They have also purchased a 50ft x 60ft prefab building to house P38 memorabilia. We will have a section for 82nd displays with no cost to our treasury. The March Field Museum is (Tuscon may challenge this) the largest aircraft museum west of the Mississippi and they plan to continue growing.

The one thing that frequently came up in your correspondence was an increase in dues and how to handle life members. Think about it as a topic for the business meeting in Boston. To best utilize our limited time, remember (1) Define the problem (2) Why is it a problem? (3) What is your suggested solution?

To be discussed at the Business Meeting , in Boston, Sept.7th.

82nd Fighter Group Association Proposed Changes To The By-Laws.

Changes are underlined.

Artical 3 - Membership and Dues

- a. Active Regular members (Second last sentence) All Regular Members, who
 pay voluntary dues, the amount established by the
 Executive Committee, shall be known as Active
 Regular Members and have voting rights.
 (Last sentence) Delete entirely.
- b. No changes.
- C. Delete Entirely.

 (Submit the following) Honorary Members are those widows of regular members or close relatives and who wish to continue to participate in the association activities, that is, receipt of the newsletter and attendance at reunions. No voting rights or dues required.
- d. (Submit the following) Associate Members are those persons who did not serve in the 82nd Fighter Group during World War II, but are friends interested in the purpose and objectives of the 82nd Fighter Group Association. Membership must be approved by the Executive Committee upon recommendation by a Regular Member. To receive the newsletter a fee of \$10.00 annually must be received. No voting rights.
- e. (Submit the following) Inactive Members are identified in three catagories.
 - Regular Members not interested in receiving the newsletter and have not paid annual dues for the past five years.
 - Honorary Members not interested in receiving the newsletter. No dues are required.
 - 3) Associate Members who have not paid \$10.00 per year for receipt of the newsletter.

CANLE HASENDI ALIGH-FAMILY MAN OF MANY TALENTS

It was a cool, cloudy day--early afternoon, and the Activity Center was at a lull; subdued chatter from the television set blended into near silence as a few residents looked on. In the far corner of the room sat Dorothy Hasenplaugh next to her husband, GAYLE, a man who has a rich history as a hobbyist.

Dorothy's story of this interesting man, GAYLE, came out as a spontaneous narrative touched with pride. As I talked with her, she ended up explaining that the stool she was sitting on had been made by him. She was so enthusiastic about it that she got up from it and folded the beautiful seat into what appeared to be a single piece of wood (not much larger than a notebook) with its own natural handle with which to carry it. It was fabulous! Dorothy explained that it was handy and saved her the trouble of looking for a chair when one wasn't available.

Not only did Gayle create a practical stool for his wife, but he also used to spread smiles on children's faces by putting his genius to work and making scooters out of old roller skates that he had purchased at swap meets. A couple of these nifty little inventions still occupy a bit of space in their neighbors' garages.

What's interesting is that GAYLE is not a carpenter. He's just had that natural desire to create. His talent, however, has extended even beyond that. According to Dorothy, he makes an incomparable batch of peanut brittle, and he's a fine cook as well. She explained that when her mother and brother were in need of her care, when they were on dialysis, GAYLE used to take care of the meals while she was away. "I miss his cooking" she confided to me.

While she and I talked, Gayle looked on, listening; but it wasn't until Dorothy started explaining GAYLE's Model A that he really brightened up, a smile crossing his lips, and animation flowing through his fingers. Dear John,

I recently spent a few hours at Foggia. It occurred to me that possibly some aspects of my visit might be of interest to others in our group. If any of it can be used by our "group communications" person, fine, if not my feelings won't be hurt. So thear it is.

A number of years ago Lingenfelter went back to our base and met a family living there. He introduced us to them by mail and they have been a joy to us ever since. We had a particularly memorable day with them this time, and I am going to guote the "thank you letter" I wrote, in an attempt to give you some of the flavor of it.

But first a brief explanation. This is about the Falcone family whose father and mother lived exactly where I once lived. An aerial photo made in 1944 verifies that fact. The father has since died and the mother now lives in Troia, but the children still own the small farm and its tiny house. The children have a nice apartment in Foggia where they live. Their names are Giuseppe (age 48), who speaks no English, and Concette (age about 45) who does speak English, and is the prime mover in always receiving us so graciously. Then there is Nicole, the son (age 21). Mothers, lock up your daughters when he is around! He speaks some English, but is undaunted by that challenge. Finally, there is the daughter, Giovanna (age 19) who speaks English (but won't) and understands English perfectly.

Three years ago when we were there Nicole had a girl friend, Claudia, who he described as "be-U-tiful!" And she was. This time when I asked him about Claudia, he said he had a new girl friend, Valerie. Then he very dramatically explained "Valerie was not as be-U-tiful as Claudia, but she was much more intelligent. Beauty does not last very many years, but intelligence lasts forever." Valerie goes to the university in Bari, but lives with the Falconies, "because (as Nicole explained, puffing out hrs chest) of me." Now for the letter.

Maggio 7, 1996

Dear Concette, Giuseppe, Nicole, Giovanna, and Valerie,

We write now (Maggio 7) to thank you for the grand time and fantastic meal we had with you yesterday, although I must wait-perhaps many days—to mail this letter. It is such a great pleasure for us to enjoy your wonderful family in your lovely apartment. The meal was unbelievable—pasta, carne, salad, prosciutto and cheeses, chocolate cake, strawberries and ice cream, espresso. And to drink: beer, delicious red wine, and champagne! It was all marvelous, and so much better than the meals on our fancy barca. Poor Giuseppe he will have to work 20 more years not just 10, to pay for all of that! (Giovanna will know all the many English words I am using to describe our wonderful time with you.)

We left in a big hurry, because we were afraid we might miss our ship. I got lost in Naples, and we just did get to the ship on time. We have very bad manners, and we are terribly embarrassed that we did not stop our car and kiss Nicole. Our profound apologies. He was especially nice to us, and we enjoyed so much his conversation. He will be a very great lawyer, but poor Valerie. Will she ever have a chance to say anything? She is beautiful, and Nicole is very lucky to have found her.

Giuseppe, the small metal you found with the name "Harvard Johnson" is very special. All soldiers wore it around their neck, so if they were killed or injured we would know who they were. 
