

Since the November '96 Newsletter the P-38 Building at the March Field Museum has been dedicated as "The Tony Levier P-38 Hangar/Museum". I have been working with Dick Willsie and others to assist in assembling detail parts for the "pros" to erect. We have also hauled in several showcases which were donated. At the dedication the building manufacturer promised to donate materials for an additional 30 feet to extend the building to 60 ft. X 80 ft.

The 475th has spent over \$7,000 for showcases and supplies to exhibit their memorabilia. It is an exhibit to be proud of. Since they were the 82nd's greatest competitor for #1 P-38 fighter group in WW II, I would like to see some competition to maintain our position in the museum. After consulting with the executive committee and other members, we have asked Roy Norris to set up a museum fund for personal contributions. Through Dick Willsie and others' efforts we have some very nice showcases and display shelving, but we need money to set up walls, partitions, lighting and other display items. I am not asking for \$7,000 but let's set up a display that the 82nd can be proud of. We need more of all types of memorabilia; photos, letters, document, medals, awards, insignia (any and all ranks) uniforms or parts thereof, or anything else that may be of interest to our descendants. You can send the memorabilia to me but send your personal money contributions to Roy.

This is for anyone interested, but especially to those close enough to drive to March Field. (Several of us drive 75 miles each way.) We need help in planning and arranging the displays. Phone me or send a letter so we can set a time to meet at the museum and put a plan into action

# DIXIE'S CHALLENGER.



Rittmeister\* Baron Moritz von Kater.

Photo taken on 12 Nov.,1917. Von Kater shot down his latest aircraft (Italian) on 10 Nov. after completing a 6-month tour with the Austrian Air Service. This was his 43rd victory. His brilliant flying over the Isonzo River Front (Northern Italy) that summer was a major factor in the demoralization of the Italian Forces; resulting in the Allied disaster at Caporetto.

( Notice he is wearing the coveted  $\underline{\textit{Pour L\'e Merite}};$  better known as the "BLUE MAX", which he was awarded for this action. )

The photo was taken just before takeoff to his new assignment in France with a stopover in Berlin, where he will lunch with the Kaiser and Empress Augusta Victoria. He ended the war with 77 confirmed victories.

( Although a World War I national hero, he was later shunned by the Nazis as "politically incorrect" and for "suspected non-Aryan ancestry.")

# Man 'fighting war with cocaine' accused of killing former POW

Garrett Thomas Sr. was a pilot who fought Nazis. Lantz Freeman is an addict who couldn't beat drugs. One is dead, the other in jail.

Garrett Thomas Sr. would sometimes talk to his family about the 13 months he spent in a prison camp during World War II — the torture, the meager rations, the forced marches through snow-covered Germany.

But for the most part, his time as a POW was something he put behind him. Over the years, he lost touch with members of his 82nd Fighter Squadron. He didn't even join the Veterans of Foreign Wars post in Sumter, S.C., where he had retired.

And though he spent his life in aviation — as a fighter pilot, instructor and air traffic controller — when he retired in the mid-'70s, boating became his passion.

His 40-foot boat, the Miss T, brought him to the Water's Edge Marina in Boynton Beach on Feb. 10. The next day, a dock master found him in a pool of blood in the cabin. Police say he was bludgeoned to death with a red marine flashlight.

"You have a person who lives through a war, who lives through a German prison camp and then he has to die like this, killed by a crack cocaine kid?" said Thomas' son, Garrett "Rocky" Thomas Jr. who lives in Ladson, S.C. "That's what I can't understand."

Police arrested Lantz Freeman, 26, of Boynton Beach on Wednesday night. Freeman faces first-degree murder charges and is being held in the Palm Beach County jail without bail.

At his first appearance Thursday, a judge asked

THIS POW MAY HAVE BEEN ON THE MISSION TO RUSSIA. TH 14TH FG WAS NOT ON THAT MISSION.




Notes from the 95th. Ftr. Sqdn. Reunion.
