

Reply to Dawn Habhab:

What a surprise to read your E-mail to Terry Massick! You may not believe this, but I was flying Andy's wing on 4-22-45, when he was shot down! We were strafing trains and convoys in the Po Valley in Northern Italy. The German ground fire was very heavy. We could see the tracers coming all around us. My plane was hit in the center nacell just ahead of the pilot compartment. I radioed Andy that I was hit and suggested that we leave the area. He radioed back that he would make one more pass at the target. On that pass he was hit and went into the Mediterranean Sea at an altitude of about 500 feet. No one saw him attempt to leave the plane. There was not time or altitude for bailout. It may be a comfort to know that he was entombed in his plane at sea. Other pilots saw this sudden episode and the crash into the Mediterranean Sea.

It is interesting that in 1952 I met one of the pilots on the same mission—in Hackensack, NJ. He (Lewis Geresi) was a teacher, and I was working for Ford Motor Co. Lew recognized me going into a store on Main St.! We played bridge together and often reviewed our last mission of WWII. There was an unwritten rule that a pilot should never go back for a second pass at the same target because the enemy would be ready for you. This is unfortunately what happened to this good pilot, Andy, on his second pass. The element of surprise gave us the advantage on the first pass at the target. We were flying in very low (just above treetop) so the enemy was not expecting us.

Andy and I were quite good friends, since he was from Lake Mills, IA, and I had attended Albert Lea, MN, Junior College, prior to transferring to St. Olaf College. I knew Andy was from a large family, and his mother was so proud of him! After 57 years it is hard to remember details.

I have told my wife several times that I was sorry that I never went to Lake Mills to visit Andy's mother when I came back from WMI. Now after all these years I hear there are two of Andy's sisters, whom I would have met! I was a Ford dealer in Duluth, MN, for 33 years. At a dealer convention I met someone who knew Andy's mother. I could be wrong, but I believe it was Robert Bliss, who is the Ford dealer in Faribauit, MN. Actually, I claimed Northfield as my hometown during WMI. Again, it was interesting that three young men from Northfield were pilots in the 82nd Fighter Group-95th Squadron. The other two were killed in action in

similar missions that took Andy down. Some say it was luck to come home alive, but if you were in the wrong place at the wrong time, you were a casualty.

Each pilot had an autographed picture of himself on the wall of the Officers' Club at Foggia, Italy. If he were

killed, his best friend kept the photo. I have the picture of Andy and would be honored to send it to you or to whomever you choose. Please send me an address.

After 33 years as a Ford dealer in Duluth, we retired to Scottsdale, AZ. We have a son still in Minnesota, in

It is a pleasure to recall Andy's friendship. These days of E-mail have surely enabled everyone to check into WWII history!

Just a note from one who witnessed the design and coloring of the 97th Fighter Squadron Insignia.

The Patch/Insignia was initially drawn up designed and colored by F.O. Urban Francis Stahl in the tent shared by Stahl, myself, my brother Richard M. Butler, and other 97th pilots while we were in North Africa.. He Called it "the Devil Cat".

I sincerely hope you will give credit for the design in Stahl's memory. Stahl was killed in a P-38 crash in Hawaii after he had completed his combat tour with the 97th Squadron 82nd Fighter Group. F.O. Stahl was from Scranton, PA

I have sent the original of the attached letter to the current commander of the 97^{th} FTS at Sheppard AFB Wichita Falls, Texas, and a copy of it and this note to Hank Phillips .

Dear Colonel Wolfgang Asmus,

The insignia of the 97th fighter squadron patch shown in the 27 November issue of the 82nd fighter Group Association news letter, is fairly accurate and coincides with the original drawn up and colored by the originator. The design was made by Flight Officer Urban Francis Stahl of the 97th squadron 82nd Fighter Group.

Stahl graduated from flying school as a S/Sgt Pilot, and was promoted to F.O. in England before we were transferred to North Africa. Together with other pilots in our tent in North Africa, I watched Stahl as he worked on the design. Among other pilots in our tent who also observed his design work, were my brother Flight officer Richard M. Butler, Major USAF (ret) deceased.

F.O. Stahl was from Scranton PA and died in a P-38 crash in Hawaii where he was assigned after his combat tour in North Africa and other areas of the Mediterranean was completed in 1943.

F.O. Stahl was a good friend of mine, and I hope that his name might be remembered as the originator of the 97th squadron insignia.

J. Wayne Jorda

Lt. Col. U.S. Air Force retired, J. Wayne Jorda, age 83, of Niceville, Fla., passed away Nov. 19, 2002.

Wayne was preceded in death by his dear wife and soulmate of 61 years, Erma Longhurst Jorda; and his parents, Emile Frances and Deseree Valton Jorda. He was born in New Orleans and attended Jesuits High School. Wayne enlisted in the Army Air Corps in September 1940. Upon graduation from flight training as a flying technical sergeant.


He was assigned to the 96th Pursuit Squadron of the 82nd Pursuit Group, Glendale, Calif. In the European theatre Wayne became a fighter ace with airto-air victories of six confirmed, two probable, and four damaged enemy aircraft of Rommel's desert forces in North Africa. In the Pacific theatre he was chief of flight testing at the Guam Air Depot in the Marianas, and during the Berlin Airlift. Wayne served as liaison to the British government for the newly formed United States Air Force in 1947. His next assignment was Eglin Air Force Base, where he negotiated with the Navy the restricted air space above Eglin, Hurlburt, and NAS Pensacola. His final overseas assignment was deputy chief advisor to the Republic of Vietnam Air Force 1956-1958.

Wayne retired from the Air Force in 1960 as Special Assistant to the Deputy for Material, Headquarters USAF, Washington, DC. Upon returning to New Orleans he started his furniture brokerage firm, "J. Wayne Jorda contract brokers."

His other accomplishments were: president of the American Fighter Aces Association in 1980; past president of American Legion Post 23 Callender-Fleming in New Orleans; first president of the Flying Sergeants Association; and a member of the Fort Walton Beach Order of Daedalians, Seagull Flight 61.



LT. COLONEL J. WAYNE JORDA, USAF

Lt. Colonel J. Wayne Jorda, United States Air Force, a native of New Orleans, Louisiana, retired in 1960 after 20 years active duty.

Enlisting in the United States Army in September 1940, Colonel Jorda entered aviation training in August of the following year. After receiving his aeronautical rating, he flew as a Staff Sergeant Pilot for seven months and was commissioned Second Lieutenant, United States Army Air Corps, September 1942.

While serving in the European Theater of Operations 1942-43, he flew 181 combat hours in the P-38 Lightning in England and North Africa. Colonel Jorda claimed 8 aerial victories while flying with the 96th Fighter Sqdn. of the 82nd Fighter Group.

During the period of 1944-45 in the Far Eastern Theater, Colonel Jorda was Chief-of-Flight Test of the Guam Air Depot, Marianna Islands.

Aerial Combat: On 15 January 1943, Wayne Jorda survived his third North African combat mission over Gabes, Tunisia where his P-38 was so severely damaged by ME 109's it never flew again. On 5 April, when American flyers pounced on a huge fighter-escorted armada of German Junker 52 Transports over the Sicilian Straits, 18 Nazi air transports and 13 other planes were shot down. Lt. Jorda was credited with two JU 52 transports and one FW 190 fighter-escort.

Tally Record: 6 confirmed, 2 probables, 4 damaged. All air.

His awards include the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Air Medal, and the Army Commendation Medal.

Born in Kerns, TX on December 7, 1920, Emory Claude Morgan died with his family at his home in Carmichael. He travelled quite a path before his death on February 6, 2003 at the age of 82. The oldest child in a Texas farming family, at the age of 15 he enlisted in the Texas National Guard. After high school graduation when he was 18, Claude transferred into the Army Air Corps, beginning a 29-year Air Force career and retiring with the rank of Colonel. He flew P-38s in north Africad uring WWII, along with various other fighter aircraft. After the war, he attended University of Southern California and received his BS Degree in Business Administration. Then as an Air Force Captain, Claude and his. wife and family were stationed in Pretoria South Africa. He returned to the states and flew B47 aircraft for three years. Then in 1957 transferred to B52s in California completing his career at Beale AFB in SR71 aircraft. After retiring from the Air Force, Claude was a Certified Financial Planner for several years and then started a usiness with an Air Force buddy importing nautical antiques. He sold the business to spend more time sailing and traveling with his lovely wife, Fern. Together, and sometimes with friends or family, they have sailed from Florida to Montreal, from Lake Michigan to Houston, and from San Diego to Sitka, Alaska, Claude also sailed for Hawait and up and down the West coast a couple of times, In addition to his many wonderful friends, Claude is survived by his wife Fern; daughter Lynda; son Michael; brother Ray; and grandchildren Justin, Jered, Anne and David. A celebration of his life will be held at 11:00 AM on February 11 at the Carmichael. In lieu of flowers, remembrances may be made in Mr. Morgan's name to the American Cancer Society.

MIELEC Airdrome, POLAND

1. <u>MISSION</u>; To strafe Mielec A/D together with 16 P-38's of the 14th Fighter Group; 36 p-51'S of the 31ST fighter Group to act as top cover.

2. A/C- CHRONOLOGY: 21 P-38'S took off from Poltava at 1010; 2 returned early (both pilot illness); 19 over target at 1320 hrs; 19 down at base at 1630 hours.

3. <u>ROUTE</u>; Base to Piryatin – 100 miles; to Krasnystaw – 410 miles; to Vistula River fork – 60 miles; to Target – 33 miles; rally 10 miles beyond target; to Piryatin – 490 miles; to base – 100 miles. Total mileage 1203 miles.

4. <u>RENDEZVOUS, FORMATION AND ASSAULT:</u> 82nd made rendezvous with 14th Fighter Group and P-51's over Piryatin at 6,000 feet at 0950 hours. 97th led, with 96th behind and 95th on left. Flight out was made at average of 3,000 feet. At IP, 97th echeloned right, with 96th to its right also echeloned right. 95th was to left of 97th, echeloned left. Strafing attack was made in company front. 82nd Group P-38's made their strafing run just too far west of Mielec A/D to permit strafing A/C on airdrome. However, the 14th Fighter Group, guided on left of 95th Squadron, passed over airdrome and smoke columns were seen from A/C set on fire by them.

- c. 1 JU-87 encountered south of target at low altitude and destroyed.

- 8. <u>FLAK</u>: SIH from behind front line. No flak noted from west side of Mielec, although men seen running from one gun enplacement.
- 9. SIGNIFICANT OBSERVATIONS:
 - Extremely heavy motor convoy, tank, and refugee movement westwards, observed west of Krasnystaw. All roads crowded.
 - b. 50 truck convoy east of Tarnow headed west.
 - c. Brief exchange of fire between P-38's and 2 Yaks which made pass at P-38's near front line on return. No damage. P-38's easily outturned Russian fighters. 8 to 10 Russian P-39's flew by formation almost immediately afterwards.
- 10. WEATHER: 7/10 O/C from base to Kiev at 3,000 ft. Clear from Kiev to Rowne. 8/10 O/C at 3,000 ft. thereafter including target area. Some haze in vicinity of target. O/C forced formation to fly at average height of 2,500 ft.

- 12. <u>RADIO SECURITY</u>: satisfactory except for chatter of 14th Fighter Group spare trying to catch formation evidently with his own receiver out.
